IN 2013-2014, CSU LIBRARIES PROVIDED STUDENTS AND FACULTY



6 million searches and **5 million** full-text downloads each year using local and systemwide discovery and access tools.



800 million searchable journal articles, dissertations and more (**100** million are full-text).



450,000 library reference consultations to support course and research work.



8,000 information literacy classroom sessions reaching over **218,000** students.



1.5 million books circulated to students and faculty.



25 million resources, including books, journal subscriptions, and DVDs.
