EQUITABLE ACCESS

Every student needs equitable access to information. CSU libraries are developing and expanding a shared core collection of digital research journals and ebooks, so that all CSU students can access the information resources they need to succeed.

LEARNING SPACES

By bringing together CSU library services with other campus learning support services in technologically rich, collaboration-friendly spaces, CSU students can benefit from a seamless learning experience, at every stage of their work.

COLLABORATIONS

CSU libraries collaborate to deliver innovative shared services that share and showcase research by CSU faculty and students; systems that manage digital assets; multi-campus pilot projects; and programs that leverage the distributed expertise of talented staff and faculty.

UNIFIED LIBRARY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (ULMS)

CSU libraries are in the process of pursuing a whole new system, a next-generation platform that will bring all functions together into one place for the libraries, the Unified Library Management System.
